PROFESSORS ATTEND CONFERENCE

Professor Moses Gomberg, of the Department of Chemistry, and Professor G. Carl Huber, of the Medical School, were appointed by President Hutchins as delegates to a conference of the National Research Council, which was held in Chicago on February first in the Ryerson Laboratory at the University of Chicago. This meeting, at which all the most prominent scientists of the country were present, was called for the purpose of discussing problems of future scientific development.

PROFESSOR H. A. GLEASON RESIGNS

Henry Allen Gleason, Associate Professor of Botany, and Director of the Botanical Gardens, has tendered his resignation to the University and will leave at the close of the first semester in February. He has accepted a position as First Assistant in the New York Botanical Gardens.

REGENTS MAKE NEW RULING ON ENTRANCE REQUIREMENTS

The Board of Regents recently voted to allow high school students whose preparatory courses have been interrupted by reason of military service or other approved war work, to enter the University during 1919 without meeting the full former requirements of 15 units or credits. Such students will be admitted on trial upon the presentation of 11 units gained either upon examination or upon official certification and recommendation by the principal of an accredited high school. A student who was, or who would have been, a senior in high school and who enlisted in any branch of the service, such as the Y. M. C. A., Red Cross, K. of C. or other patriotic associations, may apply for admission.
